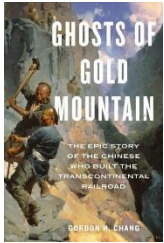
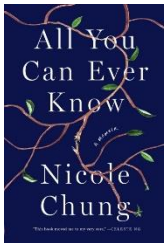




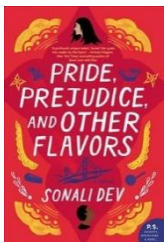
Chang, D. Eat a Peach

The story of the American railroad system is the story of the Chinese immigrants that built it. This history, the first of its kind, tells this largely ignored piece of American history.

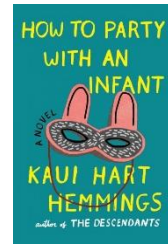


Chung, N. All You Can Ever Know

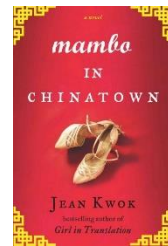


Dev, S. Pride, Prejudice and Other Flavors
Looking for something lighter? Check out this retelling of *Pride and Prejudice* set in modern-day

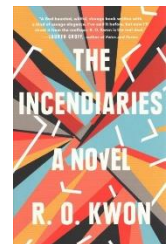
San Francisco, following the city's top neurosurgeon and her Mr. Darcy, an up-and-coming chef.



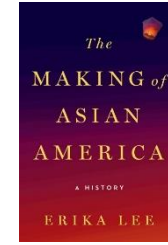
Hemmings, K. How to Party with an Infant

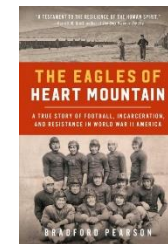
Kwon, R. The Incendiaries

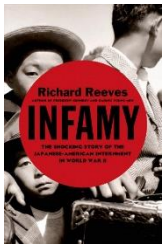


Ng, C. Everything I Never Told You

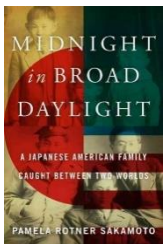
Pearson, B. The Eagles of Heart Mountain
This story of a football team representing the Heart Mountain High School in a

WWII-era internment camp for Japanese-Americans, which finished their season both undefeated and unscored against, highlights a little-known slice of life in the internment camps. Later, as young men in the camps began to be drafted, the team splits over whether to fight in the war – or fight their government, resulting in the largest mass trial in Wyoming’s history.



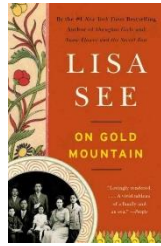
Reeves, R. *Infamy: The Shocking Story of the Japanese American Internment in World War II*

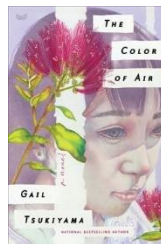
Sakamoto, P. *Midnight in Broad Daylight*
