


Alexander, R. Rasputin's Daughter

See the Russian Revolution through the eyes of the daughter of Russia's most hated man – Rasputin. A never-before



Forging a deep friendship with a Wampanoag chieftain's son on the Great Harbor settlement where her minister father is working to convert the tribe,


Bethia follows his subsequent Ivy League education and efforts to bridge cultures among the colonial elite.

Chee, A. The Queen of the Night




Lilliet Berne is a sensation of the Paris Opera, a legendary soprano who recalls her life as an orphan who left the American frontier for Europe and transformed herself from

Cornwell, B. 1356



through his competitions with Pompey, Caesar, and Crassus in the political arena, during the most fascinating time in ancient Roman history.




Hartsuyker, L. The Half-Drowned King

of his most trusted warrior and advisor.



Just released from a government internment camp where they spent most of WWII, Aki Ito and her family are about




Kibler, J. Home for Erring and Outcast Girls

Messineo, T. The Fire by Night



Randel, W. The Moon in the Palace


When chosen as the emperor's new concubine, young Mei knows nothing of the womanly arts, yet she will give the

Ratner, V. In the Shadow of the Banyan

For seven-year-old Raami, the shattering end of childhood begins with the civil war that has overwhelmed the streets of Phnom Penh, Cambodia's capital. Soon the family's world of carefully guarded royal privilege is swept up in the chaos of revolution and forced exodus. Over the next four years, as the Khmer Rouge attempts to strip the population of every shred of individual identity, Raami fights for her improbable survival.



Weir, A. The Captive Queen

When Henry of Anjou arrives at the French court, Queen Eleanor sees a way out of her discontent. The union of this royal couple will create a vast empire that stretches from the Scottish border to the Pyrenees. But Henry and Eleanor's marriage, charged with physical heat, begins a downward spiral marred by power struggles, betrayals, and bitter rivalries. This is a novel that tells the story both of the building an empire and of a royal marriage.
