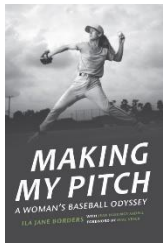


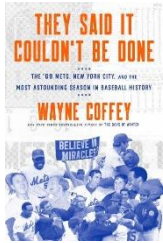
**The Bromance Book Club

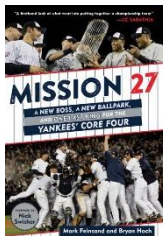
**Making My Pitch

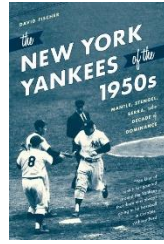
**They Said It Couldn't Be Done

A fiftieth-anniversary chronicle of the 1969 "Miracle Mets" season places their unlikely championship against a backdrop of the space race and the Vietnam War.



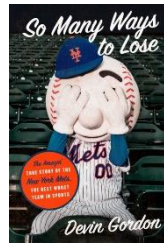
**Mission 27

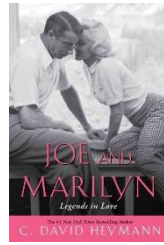
**The New York Yankees of the 1950s

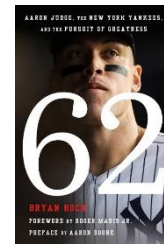
**So Many Ways to Lose

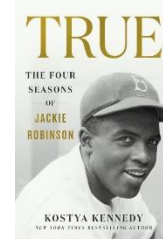
**62: Aaron Judge, the New York Yankees, and the pursuit of greatness

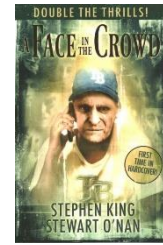
**Evvie Drake Starts Over

A heartfelt debut about the unlikely relationship between a young woman who's lost her husband and a major league pitcher who's lost his game.



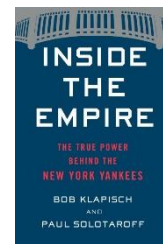
**True: The Four Seasons of Jackie Robinson

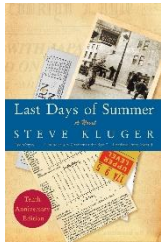
**A Face in the Crowd and the Longest December
