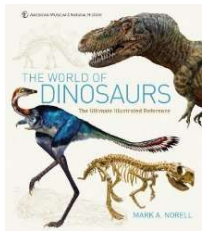


Dinosaurs of Australia and New Zealand

John Long shows that, while the fossil record from the region can be sparse and fragmentary, finds from such sites as Dinosaur Cove,

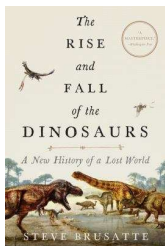
Coober Pedy etc. offer new and occasionally startling evidence.

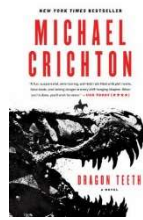
popular collection of dinosaur bones and fossils, the beloved displays at the American Museum of Natural History.

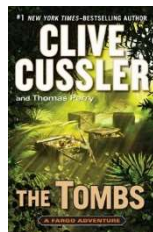

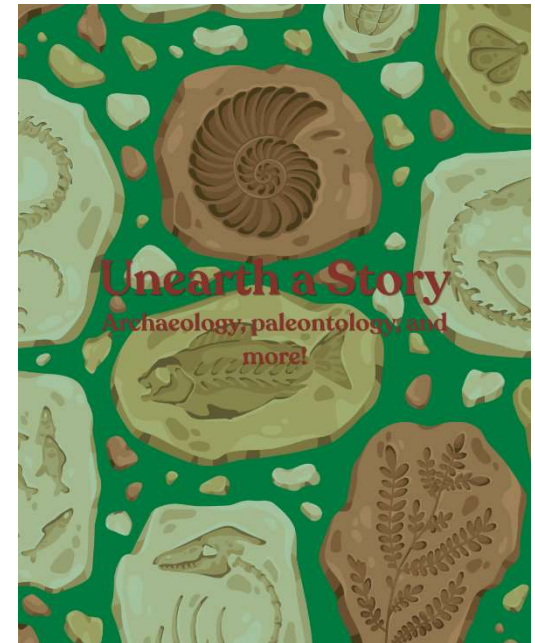
